Introduction of The Full Gospel Trust

The Full Gospel Trust of India (TFGT India)

The Full Gospel Trust of India is a registered charitable organisation under the Indian Trust Act in India. It was established in 1992 but got itself registered in 1995. It is also registered with the Home Ministry of the Government of India to receive foreign funds under the appropriate FCRA Act and with the Income Tax Department of the Government of India (12A & 80G) and is allotted an FCRA registration number and a Permanent Account Number (PAN). It has never been blacklisted, changed its name, or moved its head office, but has expanded to different state offices. Its priorities and objectives have remained the same.

Rev. Dr. Abraham Sahu is the Founder and President of the organization. He has initiated the work from rubbles and is a highly qualified and experienced person. He is a graduate in the science stream. Thereafter, he pursued his master's in social work and Personnel management. He has served the World Vision of India, an international NGO for 14 years. His responsibilities included initiating, monitoring, and evaluating development programs and human resource issues in the whole of North India. He also has been a consultant to the United Nations Drug Control Program (UNDCP) for 5 South East Asian countries in their New Delhi office. He also holds various honorary positions in other institutions and organizations.

TFGT India focuses on sustainable development through targeted projects that uplift underprivileged women, men, and children, with special emphasis on:

- Women's empowerment and protection from abuse and trafficking and holistic development of children
- Rescue, rehabilitation, and reintegration of trafficking victims

- Disaster relief, rehabilitation, and pandemic response in areas such as Orissa, Bihar, West Bengal, Gujarat, and Kashmir
- Inclusive service delivery to all Indians, regardless of religion, language, or ethnicity

Empowering Women in Northwest Delhi's Slum Communities

The Women's Empowerment Project of The Full Gospel Trust of India has been actively transforming the lives of women and girls in the slum communities of Suraj Park, Khadda Basti, Badli, and Rohini Sector 26. The initiative focuses on ensuring safety, dignity, and rights while enabling women to become confident, self-reliant, and active contributors to society.

Through education, awareness sessions, and skills training, women are supported to make independent decisions, build self-confidence, and take control of their lives both at home and in public. They also learn self-protection strategies and develop leadership qualities, preparing them for greater participation in community life.

Financial empowerment forms a key part of the project. Women are encouraged to adopt saving habits, join Self-Help Groups (SHGs), and take up income-generating activities. Several women have been guided to access small business loans, start new ventures, or expand existing ones, thereby strengthening their families' economic stability.

By building financial, technical, and moral strength, the project has created visible change women who once lacked confidence now lead SHG meetings, voice their concerns boldly, and act as role models in their communities.

This initiative proves that when women rise, entire communities move forward.

SUCCESS STORY

Reena Devi, a 44-year-old woman from Suraj Park, Delhi, transformed her life after joining the Jasmine Self-Help Group (SHG) at The Full Gospel Trust of India. With a husband working in a factory and three children to care for, she took a bold step by starting her own grocery shop two years ago through the intervention of the Trust.

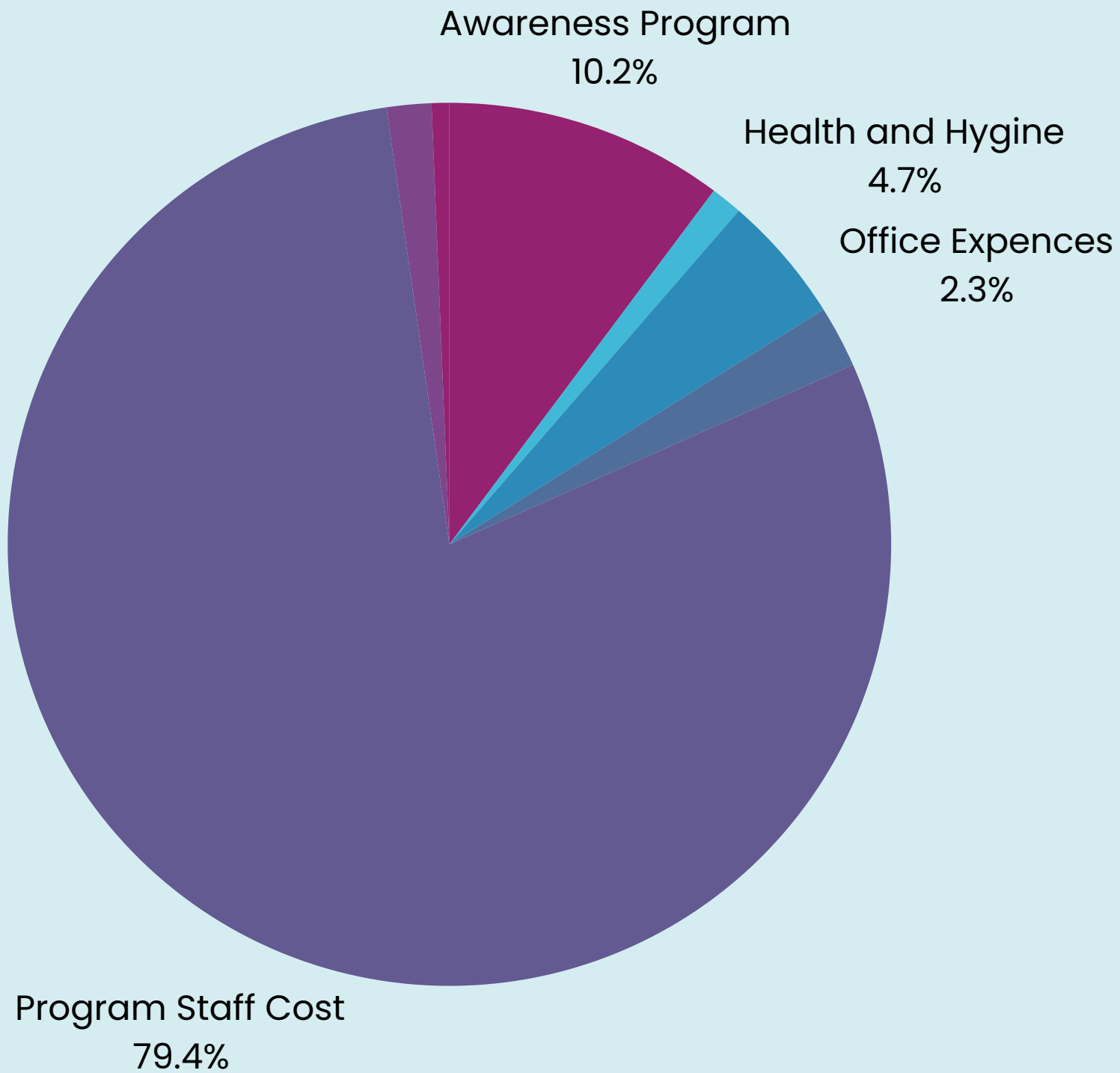
Initially hesitant, her husband later supported her decision after encouragement from Miloni Didi, who leads the SHG. Through regular meetings, Reena learned essential business skills pricing, managing profit and loss, handling loans, and repaying instalments, even without a formal education.

Each day, Reena balances household responsibilities and her shop, sometimes with help from her son. Her earnings of around ₹5,000 per month help support the family and have even allowed her to install a borewell at home. Known for her warm nature, many locals prefer to shop at her store.

Reena remains an active SHG member and has inspired over 24 women in her village to start their own businesses. With dreams of starting a flour mill next, Reena says, "I thank Miloni Didi for guiding me. I never thought I could run a business, but now I believe anything is possible."

Empowering Women and Children for a Safer, Stronger Tomorrow.

The Hifazat Project was established with the mission of promoting dignity, protection, and equal rights for women and children across underserved regions of Jharkhand—irrespective of their caste, religion, or socioeconomic background. Rooted in principles of inclusivity and human rights, the initiative has worked extensively in areas including BSR 10, BSR 6, Jehratola, Bagunnagar, Bagunhatu, and Bhojpur Colony.

Our core objective has been to ensure the safety, well-being, and educational advancement of women and children, enabling them to pursue secure, healthy, and self-determined futures. Hifazat fosters an environment where women are empowered to lead lives free from violence, discrimination, and economic dependence, with access to opportunities that strengthen their decision-making capacity, self-worth, and ability to drive positive change in their communities.

A key focus of the project has been the promotion of women's education in all its forms, recognizing it as a transformative tool for social mobility and long-term empowerment. Through our continued commitment and community-based approach, Hifazat strives to build resilient, informed, and just societies where every woman and child can thrive with dignity.

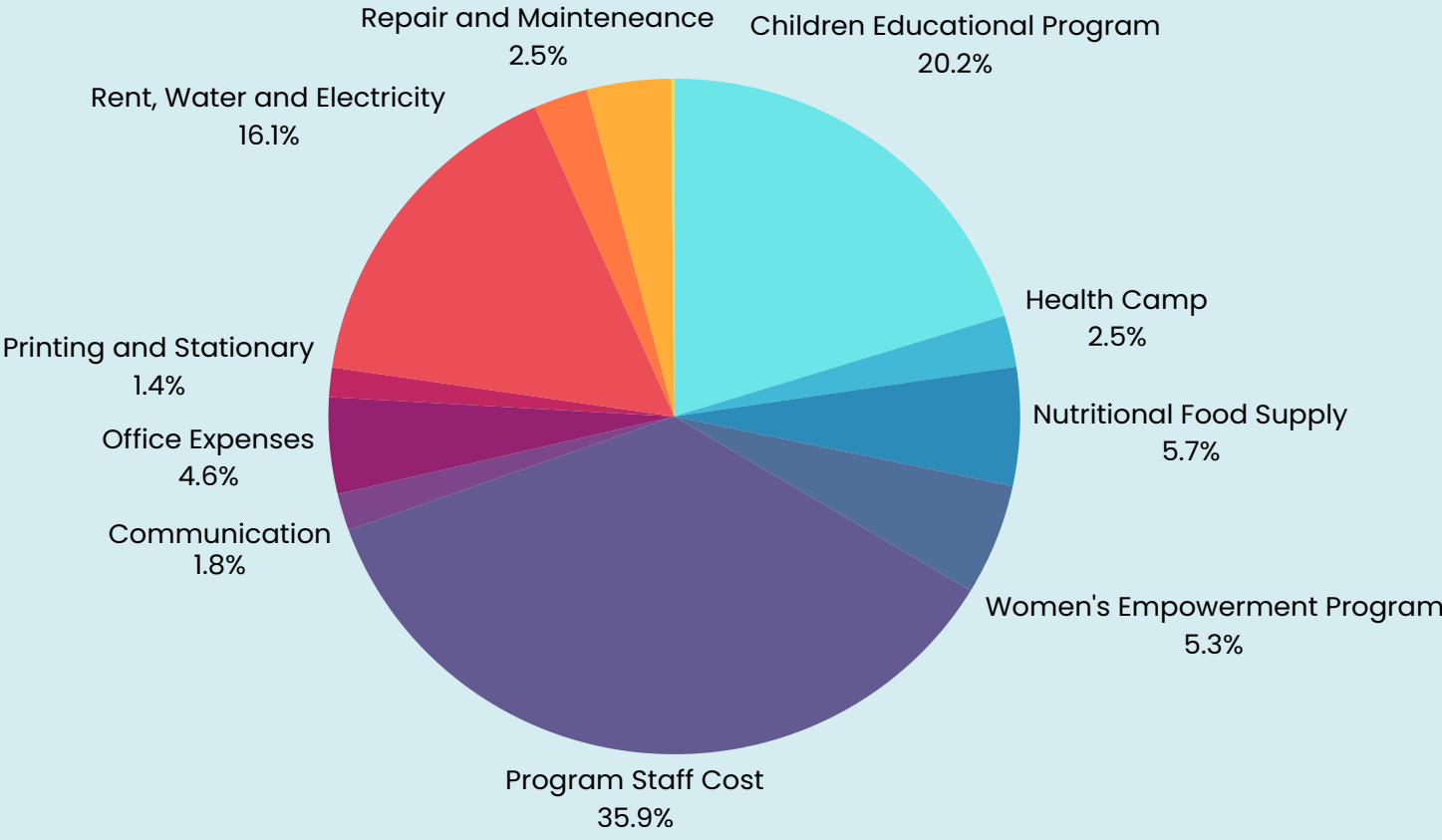

Through a comprehensive, child-centric approach, the Nai Roshni Project strives to create pathways to opportunity, equity, and long-term social impact.



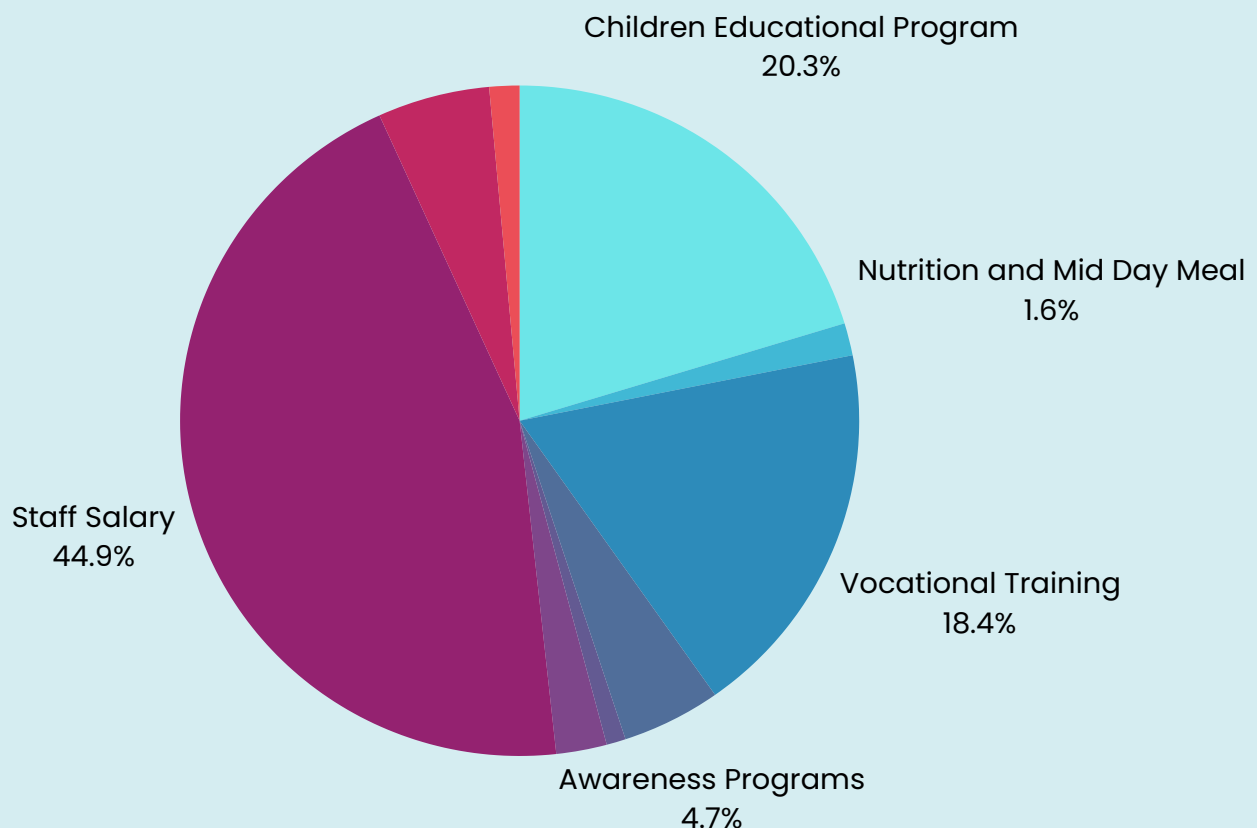

Nisha, a determined young woman from Khanda Basti, enrolled in the six-month tailoring course offered by TFGTI at one of its community centers. Throughout the training, she showed great dedication and successfully completed the course, passing the final examination with confidence.

With the skills she acquired and encouragement from the team, Nisha took a bold step towards independence. She purchased a sewing machine for her home and began her own small tailoring business. Today, she stitches blouses, salwars, sarees, and other garments for members of her local community.

Thanks to TFGTI's timely intervention and skill development support, Nisha is now able to earn a steady income and contribute to the livelihood of her family. Her journey stands as an inspiring example of how access to skill-based education can empower women to build a better, self-reliant future.

Project Haqq: Empowering Lives, Igniting Futures.

Project Haqq, led by The Full Gospel Trust of India (TFGTI), is a multifaceted community development initiative focused on uplifting marginalised communities, such as the Banjaras, across the Aligarh and Hathras regions of Uttar Pradesh. The project empowers women through the formation of Self-Help Groups (SHGs), promoting savings, microloans, and income-generating activities like bag making, envelope making, and candle production. It also runs a Baal Shiksha Kendra in Tuamai and Suhawali, offering education and mid-day meals to children from disadvantaged families. Beyond education, the project addresses health and hygiene through awareness programs on handwashing, menstrual hygiene, and personal care, while also encouraging environmental responsibility through tree plantation drives. Cultural celebrations, educational trips, and personal success stories reflect the project's impact in fostering economic independence, educational progress, and social awareness in some of the region's most underserved communities.

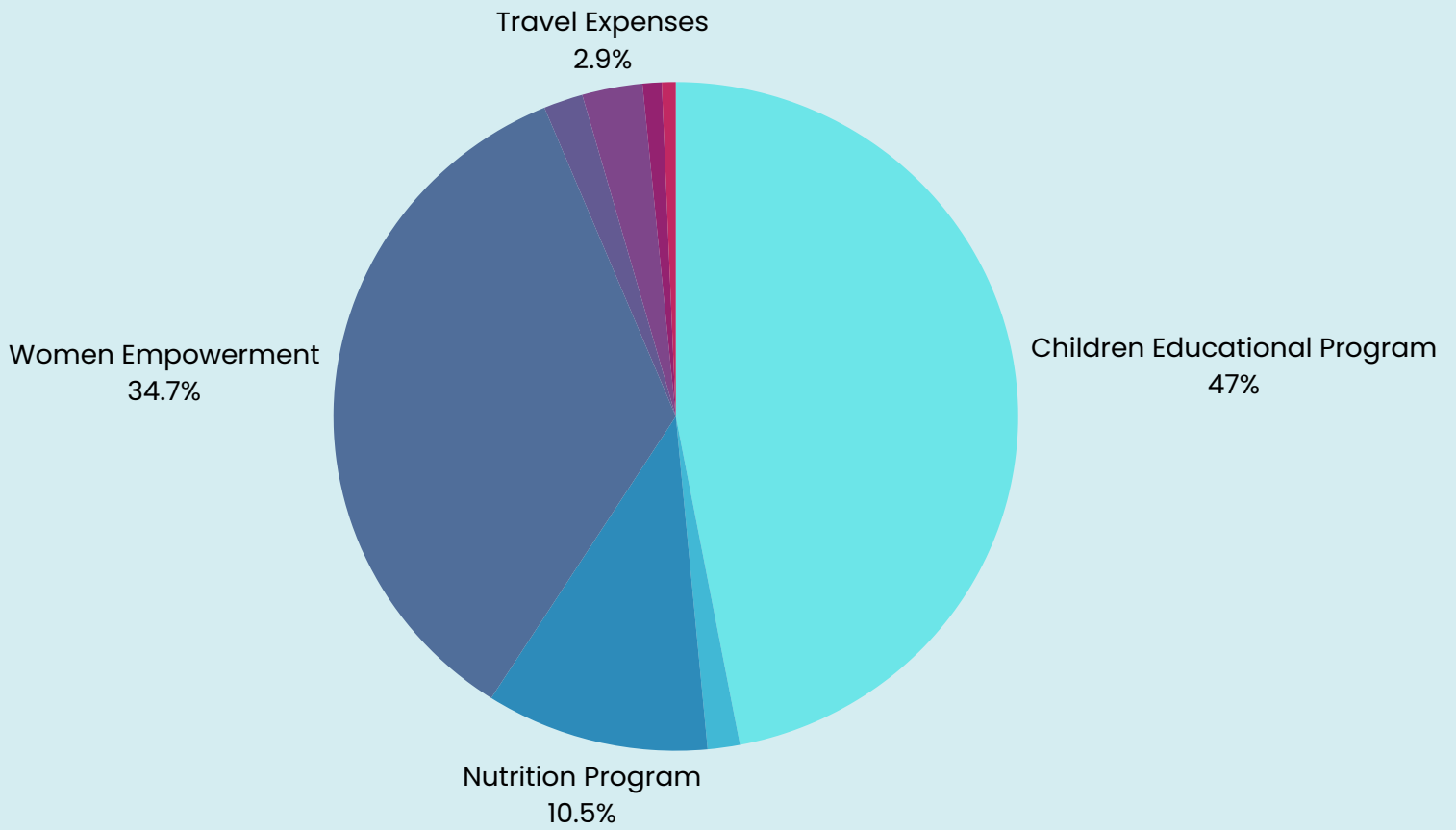

Rising with the Unseen. Standing with the Unheard

Nai Umang is a transformative initiative of The Full Gospel Trust of India, operating across ten centers of Districts Patna, Nalanda, and Aarah (Kurji Balupar, Diyavah, Khapura, Pura, Dosut, Tungi, Gaya, Godhna, Giddha and Sheetal Tola) in Bihar with a mission to uplift and empower children from some of the state's most marginalized communities, particularly the Mushahar community. Known for facing generational poverty, extreme social exclusion, and literacy rates often below 15%, Mushahar children are frequently denied access to even the most basic educational opportunities. Nai Umang addresses these deep-rooted issues by providing quality education, emotional and psychological support, life skills training, and a nurturing environment where children can thrive. The program is committed not only to academic learning but also to building confidence, identity, and dignity, enabling these children to become active, respected voices in a society that has historically overlooked them. Through this initiative, TFGTI is working to break cycles of invisibility and inequality, and to offer a future full of possibility, purpose, and hope.



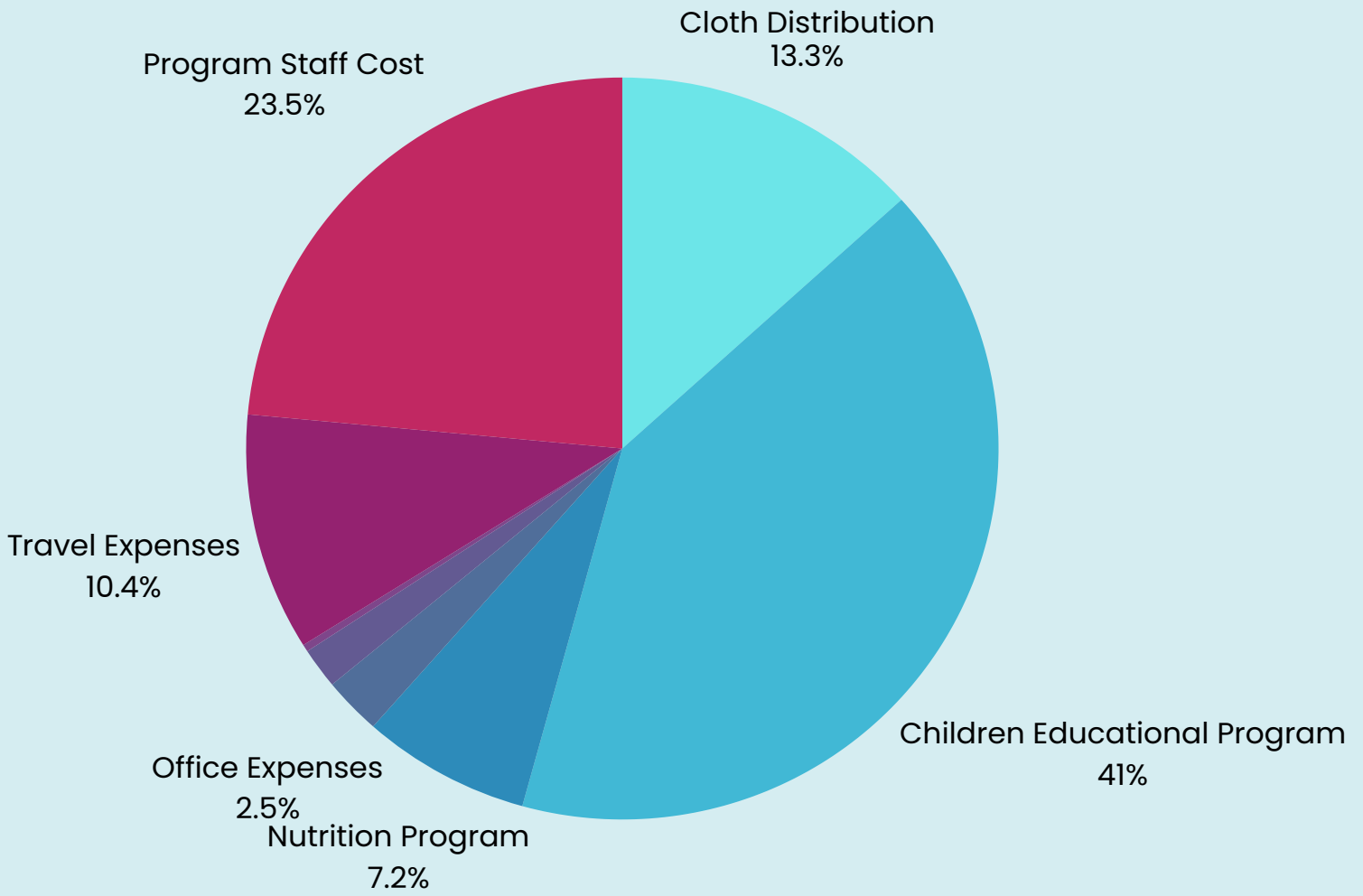

Roshni Kumari, a 6-year-old girl from Kurji Balupar Musahar Tola in Patna, Bihar, had little interest in studies and spent most of her time playing outside with other children. She didn't even know her own name properly due to having different names at home and outside. However, after the Nai Umang Center opened in her locality, the teacher personally brought her in and began teaching her through games and playful activities. Over the past 17 months, Roshni has been attending the center regularly and has made remarkable progress. She can now read and write in Hindi, recite poems, and knows the English alphabet. With the teacher's support, she has also been enrolled in a formal school, which she now attends daily. Roshni is proud of her journey and dreams of becoming a teacher herself one day.

REDEEMED

Rescuing Lives, Restoring Dignity and Nurturing Futures

Project Redeemed is an anti-trafficking initiative operating in Bagdogra, Naxalbari, and Matigara in West Bengal's Darjeeling district. Led by The Full Gospel Trust of India, the project aims to protect vulnerable communities especially women, children, and youth, from human trafficking, slavery, and organ trading, with a focus on border areas near Nepal, Bhutan, and Bangladesh.

Running since 2024, the project raises awareness through community camps, school outreach, youth activities, and IEC materials. It works in close coordination with law enforcement, border forces, and local leaders to prevent exploitation and support rescue and rehabilitation efforts. So far, the Redeemed project has reached 2,447 people directly and indirectly.

SUCCESS STORY

In Bagdogra, a young girl named Pooja narrowly escaped falling victim to human trafficking, thanks to the timely and courageous intervention of The Full Gospel Trust of India and its dedicated field team.

Pooja had been lured by a couple who gained her trust with malicious intent and were attempting to take her away forcefully. In this area, TFGTI is the only organization actively working against trafficking, and its vigilance proved to be life-saving.

When our team learned of Pooja's situation, they quickly identified her and recognized the imminent danger. Acting with urgency, TFGTI intervened and worked closely with the local police and government authorities to rescue her before she could be exploited. Without this intervention, Pooja could have been subjected to unimaginable harm, including forced labor, organ trade, or begging rackets.

Following the rescue, Pooja was safely reunited with her family. TFGTI also ensured she received emotional support and counselling to help her recover from the trauma of the incident.

This success story is not just about a single rescue; it is a powerful reminder of TFGTI's unwavering commitment to protecting vulnerable children and women in trafficking-prone areas. By being present on the ground, building trust in communities, and working tirelessly with authorities, TFGTI continues to safeguard those who are most at risk.

SUCCESS STORY

In the quiet village of Jamdui, Naxalbari, a young girl was nearly lured into human trafficking by a man posing as a job recruiter. The girl, who lived with her maternal uncle's family, was approached by the man while she was standing outside her home. He offered her a false promise, a well-paying job that would help her support her struggling family. Enticed by the prospect of earning money, she agreed to go with him without informing anyone.

Unaware of the danger she was in, she left quietly. Her family, already in severe financial distress, didn't even have the means to reach the police station to intervene or file a complaint. Fortunately, someone from the local community noticed what was happening and quickly alerted the police.

Thanks to the swift response from the authorities, TFGTI Staff and the vigilance of community members, the girl was rescued before she could be trafficked. This incident highlights the deep vulnerability of many families in remote and impoverished areas, where traffickers prey on the desperation of the poor.

Organizations like TFGTI continue to play a crucial role in awareness generation, community engagement, and emergency support, ensuring that more girls like her are protected and given a chance at a safe and secure future.



MANIPUR EDUCATION CENTRE

Emergency Educational Support in Manipur

The ethnic conflict between the Kuki and Meitei communities in Manipur, which erupted on 03 May 2023, has left a devastating impact, claiming lives, destroying homes, and forcing thousands of families into relief camps. Children from poor and vulnerable backgrounds, including those of daily wage earners, garbage collectors, security guards, single parents, and auto drivers, have been among the hardest hit. Their education has been severely disrupted due to prolonged bandhs, curfews, and ongoing unrest, placing their future at grave risk.

In response, Shalom Ebenezer Ministry, a local organization in Imphal, launched special tuition classes to support the continuity of learning for these children. At this crucial juncture, The Full Gospel Trust of India, Delhi, under the leadership of Rev. Dr. Abraham Sahu, extended its support. TFGTI was among the first Christian NGOs to step into high-risk “red zones” at the height of the conflict, providing relief, witnessing the suffering first-hand, and building trust with affected communities.

In September 2023, the Shalom Tuition Center was established with TFGTI’s support. Initially designed as a short-term project, the center continues to provide free education to children until normal schooling resumes, serving as a beacon of hope amid turmoil.

Educational Support and Nutrition Program

This project is dedicated to supporting some underprivileged children by covering their school education fees and providing daily nutritional supplements, including meals, fruits, and milk. Many of these children come from families where parents struggle to meet even basic needs, making education almost impossible. Through this initiative, we not only ensure that these children remain in school but also improve their health and learning capacity by addressing malnutrition.

The program also focuses on career guidance and mentoring, helping children look beyond their immediate struggles and dream of purposeful futures as teachers, nurses, engineers, or other professionals. Regular mentoring sessions build confidence and prepare them to become responsible citizens of India.

One of the most encouraging outcomes has been the self-reliance of families. Last year, three students were able to withdraw from the scholarship as their families' financial conditions improved, allowing them to independently support their education. This reflects the long-term sustainability and ripple effect of our intervention.

From improved attendance to inspiring success stories, the initiative continues to transform lives. Ultimately, this project aims not just to educate, but to nurture healthier, empowered children who can grow into citizens capable of contributing positively to society.
